Time Marker + Possessive Pronoun + Topic + Personal Pronoun + Comment/Action + Question

(Can add personal pronoun/referent again at the end...usually if the English sentence has 'are you?' in it or if it is a complex sentence with more than one comment).

Example 1:

English: I went to the beach yesterday.

Time marker – yesterday

Possessive pronoun - none

Topic – beach

Personal pronoun – I/me

Comment/Action – went

Question - none

Auslan: Yesterday beach me go finish.

NB. 'Went' is the past tense of 'go', and in Auslan one of the way we show past tense is by adding 'finish' after the verb. Therefore, 'went' can be signed 'go finish'.

Example 2:

English: What do you want for dinner?

Time marker – none

Possessive pronoun - none

Topic – dinner

Personal pronoun – you

Comment/action - want

Question – what?

Auslan: Dinner you want what?

NB. In Auslan, the topic is generally signed with a slight lean of the body, a slight change in facial expression and eyebrow raise, followed by a brief pause and nod. The signer then returns to a more relaxed neutral position for the comment.

Time marker – none

Possessive pronoun - none

Topic – fish

Personal pronoun – I

Comment/Action - don't like

Question - none

Auslan: Fish I don't-like

The 'really' in the English sentence is shown through expression and verb inflection/sign modification **not** by signing 'really'.

3. My dog is small, brown, and silly.

Time marker – none

Possessive pronoun - my

Topic – dog

Personal pronoun – it

Comment/Action – small, brown, silly

Question - none

Auslan: My dog, it small brown silly it

Can add 'it' again at the end for clarification as it is a complex sentence with more than one comment.

5. My father is very tall.

Time marker – none

Possessive pronoun - my

Topic – father

Personal pronoun – he

Comment/Action – tall

Question – none

Auslan: My father, he tall

'Very' is shown in expression and sign modification **not** by signing very.

2. Are you going to the library tomorrow?

Time marker – tomorrow

Possessive pronoun - none

Topic – library

Personal pronoun – you

Comment/Action – going

Question – are you?

Auslan: Tomorrow library you go you?

You don't sign 'to' unless really necessary, relevant and can't be signed another way. You don't sign articles (the), with the exception of signing the proper name/title of something.

4. I want a drink.

Time marker – none

Possessive pronoun - none

Topic – drink

Personal pronoun – I

Comment/Action – want

Question – none

Auslan: Drink, I want

6. Please pass me the salt.

Time marker – none

Possessive pronoun - none

Topic – salt

Personal pronoun - me

Comment/Action – pass, please/thanks

Question – none

Auslan: Salt, pass-me thank-you

The verb 'pass' can be inflected to show direction.

7. What did you have for dinner last night?

Time marker – Last night

Possessive pronoun - none

Topic – dinner

Personal pronoun – you

Comment/Action – have/eat

Question – what?

Auslan: Last night, dinner, you eat what?

Auslan is a visual language, and so rather than relying on the English word, convey the meaning...so you can replace 'have' with 'eat', cause you usually eat your dinner, not hold it in your hand.

8. Where are you going tomorrow?

Time marker – Tomorrow

Possessive pronoun - none

Topic – depends on intonation

Personal pronoun - you

Comment/Action – go

Question – where?

Auslan: Drink, I want

9. Where's the toilet?

Time marker – none

Possessive pronoun -

none

Topic – toilet

Personal pronoun – none

Comment/Action – none

Question – where?

Auslan: Toilet where?
